- 3. Which clef does the viola typically use? [1] Treble | Alto | Tenor | Bass
- 4. What does a mute do to the sound of a viola? [1] Louder | Softer | Change the pitch



5. Listen carefully to the extract from Toru Takemitsu's A *Bird Came Down the Walk* (2:38). From 2:44–2.45, how many notes is the viola playing simultaneously? [1]

Extension: Research the history of William Walton's *Viola Concerto* and write a short essay about what you have found. You might like to consider Walton's dates (when he was born & died), when this piece was written, why it was written and for whom, and the circumstances surrounding its first performance.
